


# TEJIENDO CAMINOS

The **Tejiendo Caminos project** aims to contribute to a comprehensive response in protection and healthcare, with a gender and inclusion approach, targeting vulnerable individuals affected by migration, violence, and displacement.

It integrates the Humanity & Inclusion approach, focused on preventing disabilities and providing support and assistance to those with disabilities, alongside **CARE Colombia's** leadership in global humanitarian response, peacebuilding, and gender equity. **This initiative is implemented with support from the European Humanitarian Aid Agency.**



## OUR GENERAL OBJECTIVE

Vulnerable people affected by migration, violence, and displacement in Colombia (Cauca, Nariño, Norte de Santander, La Guajira, Cundinamarca, and Antioquia) can access a range of basic healthcare and protection services in a dignified and equitable manner, ensuring their needs are met, their rights respected, and their integrity, well-being, and dignity protected.



## OUR SPECIFIC OBJECTIVE:

To contribute to an integrated and quality response in protection and healthcare that meets the basic and specific needs of those affected by migration, violence, and displacement in Colombia. This is achieved through service delivery, disaster preparedness, capacity and systems strengthening, information dissemination, awareness-raising, and advocacy.

# SERVICES



## PROTECTION

Prevention, mitigation, and response to gender-based **violence and violence related to disability**. This is achieved through awareness strategies, community care, strengthening safe spaces, and case management. These actions help accompany, guide, and facilitate the population's access to their rights.



## Health

Physical and functional rehabilitation, mental health, and sexual and reproductive health services. These address the critical needs of vulnerable groups affected by migration, displacement, and internal armed conflict by promoting health, preventing disease, and managing risk while ensuring the fundamental right to healthcare.

## ADVOCACY

CARE and Humanity & Inclusion conduct **Rapid Gender and Disability Analyses (RGDA)** to highlight the differentiated impacts that the armed conflict and migration crisis have had on women, men, children, adolescents, people with diverse sexual orientations and gender identities (SOGI), and people with disabilities. Additionally, they produce bulletins that analyze the gaps in services provided to migrants and victims of the armed conflict.

### Response to Mixed Migration Flows:



**Services provided at fixed service points:**  
Specialized care



**Services provided at mobile points on the road:**  
Primarily for people in transit: Rapid response (Protection and Health)

Referral to fixed points of the Consortium, other organizations, or relevant State institutions.

### Response to Armed Conflict:

Services are delivered through care campaigns, fixed service points, and coordination with leaders, organizations, and institutions. Complementary and specialized care in detention centers.
